Your Input Is Needed!



There's good news for Menominee Indian School District: The District is receiving \$6 million in funding through the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act, the third federal COVID-19 relief law passed in March 2021. These one time funds come through the Elementary and Secondary School **Emergency Relief** (ESSER) III grant program.

Now, MISD needs your thoughts and input about how that money will be used within the guidelines of the grant. A <u>virtual Zoom meeting</u> will be held from 5—6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 29 and everyone is welcome to participate.

"The funds are to be

used to support our response to the COVID-19 pandemic, helping us safely reopen and continue to safely operate our schools, as well as addressing the impacts the pandemic has had on our students," explains MISD Superintendent Wendell Waukau. "It's important for us to hear from our parents, teachers and community as we decide how to use the funds."

During the meeting, MISD leadership will present an overview of the funding, then have attendees go into virtual breakout rooms to share their thoughts about the needs of MISD students and grant funding priorities.

At least 20% of the funding must be used to implement evidence-based interventions to address learning losses that occurred

because of the pandemic's impact.

Attendees who log on for the entire meeting will be entered into a drawing at the end of the meeting for a chance to win one of 10 gift card packages valued at \$50 each. Gift cards will be for local businesses.

"We all know COVID has impacted learning, but this funding gives us an opportunity to work together as a community to do something about that," added Waukau. "This is a great opportunity to provide feedback and I am hoping for a strong turnout and lots of great ideas."

Classes are back in session! Even with masking, you could tell there were smiles all the way around at MIHS as students, teachers and staff gathered together again for the start of the 2021-22 school year in September.









With school now underway for about a month, most students and families are falling into a routine once again.

Here's an important question to ask: Does your routine include talking about the importance of being in school each and every day? Studies show that missing as little as two days of school per month puts a student at an increased risk of not graduating high school. If you think

about it, it makes sense. Most class lessons build upon the previous lesson. If you miss too many days, it can be very difficult to catch up again. Once that cycle begins, it becomes frustrating for students, parents and teachers alike.

If your teen doesn't see the harm in missing a day or two, here's something that might get their attention: According to Attendance Works. chronic absence can affect your ability to

earn a living. Dropouts are less likely to succeed in a career. In fact, a high school graduate makes, on average, \$1 million more than a dropout over a lifetime.

Finally, if your child has to miss multiple days of school due to a health issue or family situation, meet with your child's teacher to map out a plan of action to keep your student on track.

Vaisvilas shared the
journey Corn Jr. has
been on throughout
his life, and why he
feels it is important
for all Menominee to
learn the language.
Corn Jr. is one of less
than 29 fluent speakers of the Menominee
Language.

During the pandemic, Corn Jr. and his childhood friend
Burton Warrington
(Kcheyonkote) created
an online Menominee
Language learning
platform:
Menomini yoU.

With an online program, all tribal members now have an opportunity to learn the language, whether it's 10 minutes a day or though comprehensive, multi-week online courses. The approach includes recorded videos, worksheets and live, virtual group sessions.

In the article, Corn Jr. says he hopes most Menominee people will be able to speak their language in the next few years.

He told the reporter:
"We've got really big
dreams here. If we're
successful, our next
struggle is to renormalize the language.
Now, it's considered
cool to speak Menominee, but hopefully
one day it'll be
expected."

Thank you Ron for not just preserving the Menominee Language, but for sharing it and encouraging others to learn as well.
