## New High School Progress

Progress continues to be made on our new Menominee Indian High School project. We are nearing the end of our design phase; over the last eight months we have regularly met with our design and construction team to make sure the new MIHS represents our culture and creates a warm, welcoming environment that fosters learning.

The construction project will be bid out in two separate bid packages. The first bid package, which includes the site, will be competitively bid in March. The remainder of the project will be competitively bid out in April. Our construction manager will be managing the bidding process and will contact local contractors to encourage participation. If local contractors are interested in participating, they can also contact the school for a link to the project documents for bidding.

A goal of our project was continuation of student, staff and community engagement. We have gathered feedback from staff and students throughout the design process. Additionally, MIHS students have the opportunity to learn about careers in design and construction through a Career Presentation Series. The series consist of ten presentations that focus on different careers ranging from design and construction to marketing, estimating, on-site building trades and everything in-between. There is a lot of work that happens behind the scenes and our students will have an opportunity to learn about careers and ask questions of professionals who do this for a living.

The end of the school year will also mark a milestone celebration for our project. The District is planning on hosting a groundbreaking at the end of May to commemorate the start of construction on the new Menominee Indian High School. More details to come – stay tuned!
